FROM THE RECTOR The Reverend Sue Lederhouse

And so here we are – on the brink of Resurrection and New Life – on the brink of celebrating Easter once more. But first we have to go through the intensity of Holy Week. We go from the joy of Palm Sunday to the horror, pain, and tears of Good Friday. We walk the walk with Jesus through it all.

Why do we do it? Why do we take this journey each year? We know how the story ends. We've been there before. We've walked this walk.

And yet each time is different. We're in a different place. We've been through a variety of things in the year in between. We've faced some hard times and hopefully enjoyed some good times. We've had some loss and perhaps some rebirth. We're different people than we were at this time last year.

And so we may experience this Holy Week differently. The journey on Palm Sunday may feel different. The horror of Good Friday may hit us more strongly this year. And yes – Easter may seem more joyful. OR NOT. Each of us is different – each of us sees things in a unique way.

But I invite you to take this journey once again this year. See the schedule of services elsewhere in this newsletter. If you haven't come to all the Holy Week services in the past, try to do so this year. And NO – you DON'T have to have your feet washed if you come to the Maundy Thursday service! Start Holy Week as you come and wave palms on Palm Sunday and sing "Make Way, Make Way, for the King of Kings." On Maundy Thursday, remember the first Eucharist as Jesus shared it with His disciples on the night before he was arrested, have your feet washed by Deacon Bob or me if you so desire, and at the end of the service, see the altar change as we strip it of its beauty in preparation for Good Friday. On Good Friday, join in the responses of the crowd during the reading of the Passion as together we cry out: "Crucify! Crucify!" See how that feels as you say it. Kneel before the cross and then feel that tug in your heart at the end of the service as we sing "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?"

The Holy Week journey is a rich one – will you come and follow me this year in this important week?

THE DEACON'S CORNER

I was dozing in my recliner, day-dreaming about warm weather April days, when crocuses begin to poke their heads above ground. A whole month vacation in Key West! Got to begin packing. Make a list! Let's see now: Jimmy Buffett CDs, flip-flops, shorts and t-shirts, suntan lotion, beach blanket/umbrella and sunglasses for Buddy. Don't forget the blender (can't make Margaritas without it). Also, remember to bring along a road atlas for the drive down. Doesn't matter that the maps for Pennsylvania are missing. What happened to them anyway? I'm sure there's a story there, but can't remember. OK, check and double-check! Got everything. All set to leave on April 1st!

Then, I awake with a start, realizing that I've only been dreaming. No month in Key West. It's all been a big April Fool. Not to worry, Rev. Sue, I'm not going anywhere. The Deacon is still "hitched to the plow" and available for duty. I'll be here to watch the ice go out in the Canal and for a considerable period of time thereafter. Meantime, we've got a lot of work to do. Holy Week and Easter are right around the corner. The Lenten Study on "Wilderness Experiences" has been well-attended. We've got a great group of people in that class and the material is holding everyone's interest. I'm looking forward to the rest of the Lenten journey.

I'd guess that Sue is going to have a lot to say about Easter, so I'll write about something else. Did you know that April 25th is the Feast Day of St. Mark, the Evangelist? His Gospel, written sometime between 65 and 70 A.D., is the earliest of the four Gospels by at least 20 years. The only earlier accounts of the early church that we have are the Epistles that can definitely be attributed to St. Paul.

Some say that the author of Mark was the John Mark, one of Jesus' 70 Disciples who accompanied Paul and Barnabas on their first missionary journey. He's the one whom St. Paul refused to take with him on later missionary journeys. After leaving Paul and Barnabas, Mark went to Cyprus, later returning to Jerusalem and accompanying St. Peter to Rome.

When St. Paul was sent under arrest to Rome, Mark joined Paul and Timothy there. It is said that this is when he wrote his Gospel which reflects the teachings of St. Peter as he heard them preached in Rome. It is a bare-bones, business-like account without literary embellishment ("Just the facts Ma'am", as Rev. Sue is fond of saying).

Mark later traveled on missionary journeys to Egypt and North Africa before returning to Alexandria (Egypt) where he had earlier started a Christian school, whose graduates would later include St. Clement. It was in Alexandria that he was seized by a crowd of pagans and so roughly handled that he died from his injuries. His followers buried him in a stone vault there. A church was built over his tomb in the 4th Century. In the 9th Century, when the Muslims took control of Egypt, the Doge (Duke) of Venice, the head of a powerful trading empire, arranged to have St. Mark's remains transferred to Venice, where he built a great Basilica to house Mark's relics. St. Mark has been associated with Venice ever since. His church is hard by the Doge's palace in the great central square of Venice. It is a majestic place to visit, just don't go there in the later winter/early spring when the streets of Venice often flood. You might be standing in knee-high water.

THE CROSS

We are about to enter Holy Week, and the greatest symbol of this most blessed time of the year is the cross. The cross has become one of the best known universal symbols of Christianity. A strange symbol for us to worship when you think about what it represents. The crucifixion is one of history's worst possible reminders of cruelty and torture known to mankind. One of man's greatest sins against humanity.

What is it about the image of the cross that makes us want to be reminded of that horrible event? After all, we don't typically post pictures of other forms of execution on our walls at home or work, or wear them on our clothes or as jewelry. Why would we want to keep looking at that cross, and choose an image of something that is so depressing to be the symbol of our faith?

Well, I read this explanation once, that the cross's horizontal beam represents outstretched arms, like God's love for us. It represents the width of God's love. The vertical beam represents the height of His holiness reaching up as God's holiness. The cross also is the intersection where God forgave our sins without lowering His standards. Suspended on the cross between us and God, our sins were placed on Jesus. This sacrifice was not for just CERTAIN people, but "God so loved the WORLD that He gave His only Son".

Jesus, with His arms painfully stretched out far to the left and far to the right, is nailed in that position to show He reaches out to us all. In that most horrible image imaginable, our sins died there with Him on those beams. That's agape love! That's worth remembering! I could never offer up any of my loved ones in that sacrificial way, but God did for us.

During Holy Week, what will you be thinking of when you look at that cross? Wouldn't it be much easier to daily look at a risen Christ with His crown of glory on the cross instead of a suffering Jesus? The answer is, of course it would. We all prefer happy endings, but do we really want to, and can we afford to, forget that supreme sacrifice? Personally, it is a reminder to me that I should spend every day of my life being thankful that God wants me and loves me that much.

In our busy and sometimes selfish lives, we all too often forget to be thankful for what we have been blessed with. We need to focus on that cross with all its good and painful reminders, not just during Holy Week but in our daily walk with Jesus. Unlike the early Christians who had to experience the firsthand horrors of the crucifixion, during Holy Season we are blessed to know a happier ending to that story. When I daily look at that cross with the suffering Christ, I think of how life has its good and bad times, even for us as Christians. But that cross should also be a reminder that there is a happy ending for us believers, as it was for Jesus. That happy ending is the Resurrection. It gives us new and renewed hope that we will someday be with Christ, and face to face can then personally thank Him for all His grace, mercy and blessings. What a great day that will be! What a wonderful gift that cross is to us, that because of His suffering, we can now be called a child of Christ!

HOLY WEEK AND EASTER AT ST. PETER'S

Palm Sunday, April 9, 8 and 10 a.m. We continue our tradition of experiencing Palm Sunday as it would have been at the time of Jesus. We will celebrate Jesus' triumphal ride into Jerusalem with our Liturgy of the Palms. Then we process into the church singing "Make Way, Make Way, for the King of Kings." It will be a joyous celebration even as we know what lies ahead on Good Friday when we will hear the reading of the Passion.

Maundy Thursday, April 13, 7 p.m. On Maundy Thursday, we commemorate the institution of the Eucharist. We also have the opportunity (but not the requirement) to share in the Mandatum – Jesus' gift of love that we observe in the act of foot washing. At the end of the Maundy Thursday service, the candles are extinguished, the altar is stripped of all its ornaments, and we depart in silence.

Good Friday, April 14, 12 noon and 7 p.m. On Good Friday, we remember the crucifixion and death of Jesus. This is the most solemn service of the Church Year. We participate in the reading of the Passion. We share in the consecrated bread and wine from the Maundy Thursday service to sustain us through the sadness of this day. At the end of each service, we leave in total silence.

Easter Day, April 16, 8 and 10 a.m. We celebrate the day of Resurrection with a festive Eucharist at each service. There will be hymns at the 8 a.m. service and hymns and choir at the 10 a.m. service. An Easter egg hunt follows the 10 a.m. service.

FOOT WASHING - AN OPPORTUNITY NOT A REQUIREMENT

As part of the Maundy Thursday liturgy these past few years, we have offered the opportunity for worshipers to have their feet washed. This is completely optional. It is not a requirement that you participate in this if you do not want to. You can attend the Maundy Thursday service without having your feet washed.

This practice of foot washing comes from Jesus' Mandatum (commandment) that we love one another as He has loved us. We model His example of washing the disciples' feet. It is a traditional Maundy Thursday practice and mirrors the Gospel reading that we have each year.

In the past, a number of people have participated. If you would like to be part of the foot washing, there will be chairs set up in front of the first pew near the piano where you can sit while we wash your feet. You can help by wearing socks (no stockings!) and removing them prior to the foot washing. I encourage you to pray about participating in this. As always, please talk to me if you have questions.

VISIBLE VESTRY

1. The Vestry had their annual retreat and Vestry February Vestry meeting on February 25. The agenda of the retreat was goal setting for 2017-2018. Vestry members broke into three groups. Each group had a recorder and a facilitator assigned. The groups addressed the following three main areas of need:

ADMINISTRATION (Archives, Building/Grounds, General Administration and Finance).

INREACH (Parish Life and Pastoral Care)

OUTREACH (Outreach and Communications)

Both of these times will include a coffee hour. Parishioners will be able to see what opportunities are available for their ministry service participation. Sign-up sheets will be available.

Following the Ministry Fair, there will be a meeting date set for each "Ministry Team". The groups will develop individual goals and ideas for their specific area of ministry. Please stop by and support this fair. We need your help in accomplishing St. Peter's many ministry goals. We guarantee that there will be something for everyone!!

At the Vestry Meeting for February which was part of the Retreat, the Vestry approved the 2016 Parochial Report.

- 2. It does not appear that we will be having any Mass Maritime (MMA) cadets parking in our lot this year, due to the new MMA parking lot that has opened this school year and other available town parking closer to the college.
- 3. Rev. Sue continues to research other options for a new book bin company.

- 4. Frank Walker has been doing a great job as our new Building Manager. He will be stripping and waxing the Parish Hall floor before Holy Week and he is painting the ceiling in the bathrooms by the Sacristy.
- 5. We will be advertising our Holy Week and Easter services on the Holiday Services page of the *Bourne Enterprise*.
- 6. Thank you to Millie Funnell from our 8:00 service for making two dust covers for the altar to keep the fairlinen clean.
- 7. There will be a communion class for children aged 7 and older beginning on April 23. Children will be presented at the 10:00 service on Pentecost, June 4.
- 8. Great News!!! This year, St Peter's will be having its 70th anniversary of the church building coming down from Hull. Bishop Alan Gates will be coming to St. Peter's on September 29 for a service of rededication. We are very excited about planning this celebration and will have a sign-up sheet for anyone who would like to be part of helping with that "party". More details to follow.
- 9. On February 28, we had our Shrove Tuesday pancake supper followed by a sing along and game night. Those who attended had a fun night.
- 10. On March 2, we began our Lenten Study titled, "A Way through the Wilderness". Each lesson starts with a short video introduction to each chapter by the author, The Rev. Rob Renfroe, who is Pastor of Discipleship at the Woodlands United Methodist Church in Houston, Texas. The study has included interesting sharing discussions regarding difficult times and changes in our lives we have gone through, and what we have learned from those times, as well as how and if, we felt our faith helped us through these times.
- 11. It appears we may be able to get some MMA Cadets to help us with our annual spring yard clean up. Cadets need to do a certain amount of community service and we have a need for weeding, yard work and sheds that need to be painted. Deacon Bob will be looking further into this possibility, which would most likely be happening sometime in April or early May. We may be looking to the congregation to lend yard tools and work gloves to help us supply these cadets for that day. More information will be available soon.

Deacon Bob continues to be an important liaison for St. Peter's with the MMA, and on April 29 at 7 p.m. he will be conducting a worship service there for the cadets.

- 12. On March 11, St. Peter's hosted the Diocesan Congregational Business Practices Workshop. Approximately 30 people attended including Rev. Sue, Dianne Cartmill, our Treasurer, and Priscilla Ellis, our Assistant Treasurer.
- 13. Palm Sunday is April 9 and there will be services at 8 and 10 a.m. Maundy Thursday is April 13 and the service is at 7 p.m. Good Friday is April 14 and there will be services at 12 noon and 7 p.m. The choir will be singing at the evening service. Easter Day is April 16 and there will be services at 8 and 10 a.m. There will be an Easter Egg Hunt following the 10 a.m. service. We hope you will attend all services and walk with us through another beautiful Holy Week.




