One of the least known services in the *Book of Common Prayer* is the service called "A Thanksgiving for the Birth or Adoption of a Child," found on pages 439-445. It can be used right after the birth or adoption of the child if the parents aren't quite ready to look at baptism. Because this service is so rarely held, the rubrics (or instructions in italics) at the end of the service are also rarely read. Here's what they say:

The minister of the Congregation is directed to instruct the people, from time to time, about the duty of Christian parents to make prudent provision for the well-being of their families, and of all persons to make wills, while they are in health, arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods, not neglecting, if they are able, to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses."

A priest I knew used All Saints Sunday as a time to remind everyone about how important it is to look ahead and to "take care of business" so that your end-of-life planning is complete BEFORE your end of life. And it also helps those who are left behind not to have as heavy a burden of picking up the pieces. **So – this is my reminder and instruction to all of us – to look toward the future.**

Back in 2014, we held a series of workshops entitled "Taking Care of Business" and those who attended were invited to think seriously about making these important decisions including funeral planning. Over these past 3 years, I have had 5 people come to talk with me about these important topics. **What about you??** If you attended these workshops, I urge you to find the packet that was distributed and review your plans and make an appointment with me to talk about them. If you've lost or misplaced those papers, let me know – I have extras! If you didn't attend those workshops and are interested in doing some future planning, let's talk, and I can help guide you. Believe me – your children and your grandchildren and other family members will be so thankful that you made some of these hard decisions and did some thoughtful planning!!

And as we celebrate another All Saints Sunday here at St. Peter's, I am thankful for those who will be baptized on that day. AND I am thankful for ALL the saints who have been a part of this place – young and old, male and female, those still here and those who are partakers of the eternal wedding banquet with our Lord. And remember and take to heart the closing words to one of the most favorite All Saints hymns: "For the saints of God are just folk like me and I mean to be one too!"

THE DEACON'S CORNER

November. It can't be here already! Where did I put my Purple Stole? Advent is just around the corner. We've got a full month coming up, but we also had a busy month of October too! Bud just said he wants to bless the animals again, like we did on October 15. I don't blame you for wanting to do it again, Bud. That was really fun, but you'll have to wait until next October :-). We had 15 puppies of varying ages and there were 3 cats who could not be present, but we blessed their pictures anyway. We also had 20 human owners, as well as a photographer/reporter from the *Bourne Enterprise* (See the October 20th edition of the newspaper).

Looking ahead to what's going on in November:

All Saints' Day, and **the Commemoration of All Faithful Departed (All Souls' Day)**. They're not the same thing, you know. The simplest way to keep them straight is to remember: **All Saints' Day (November 1)** is a celebration of the Communion of All the Saints. All the faithful (living and dead) are included in this category. They include: those notable men and women, known and unknown, living and dead, some of whom may be found in the book "**Holy Women and Holy Men**". And also, those saints (all the faithful departed), ordinary people who have gone before us. We remember and pray for them. They are just as alive as you and me. They are still praying for us, too, you know! It's also a day to celebrate the living saints, you me and every other faithful person living on earth, by being mindful of our relationship to one another, and our obligation to live as saints every day.

“The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed” (as we Episcopalians refer to it), also known as **“All Souls’ Day” (November 2)**, is a day when we remember and pray particularly for the souls of all those who are no longer with us, having entered into the larger life beyond this one.

Thanksgiving Day (November 23): We all know what that’s about. Watch those second helpings!

Christ the King Sunday (November 26): Pope Pius XI instituted the Feast of Christ the King in 1925. Its date was set as the last Sunday in October. In 1969, Pope Paul VI moved the date to the final Sunday of the Liturgical Year, immediately before the First Sunday of Advent. We Episcopalians also celebrate it on the same date. The feast has an eschatological dimension pointing to the end of time when the kingdom of Jesus will be established in all its fullness to the ends of the earth. It also leads us into [Advent](#) when the Church prepares for the arrival of the newborn King. Its significance is to remind us that Christ must rule in our minds, wills, hearts and bodies.

Saint Andrew the Apostle (November 30): We celebrate this day in remembrance of Andrew the fisherman, brother of Simon (Peter), who led Peter to Christ.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE IN BOURNE - WHAT CAN ST. PETER’S DO?

On October 14th and 21st, St. Peter’s sponsored programs intended to educate the parish to the very real problem of opioid addiction on both sides of the Canal.

On the 14th, we presented the movie **“Heroin: Cape Cod, USA”** to get the conversation going. We also had a presentation by two people from our parish, Donna Beers and her son Ryan. Their entire family struggled with Ryan’s addiction, but thankfully have “turned the corner” in that struggle. They put a really personal face on the problem. It could happen to anyone. Larry Higgins, a retired policeman, also talked of his experiences dealing with addiction on the streets.

On the 21st, we sponsored the second half of the event, a panel discussion featuring: **Ms. Patricia Mitrokostas**, Director of Prevention, Gosnold, Cape Cod; **Ms. Gail Dufault, RN**, from the Barnstable Sheriff’s Department/Barnstable County House of Correction; **Detective Sgt. Jonathan MacDougal**, Bourne Police Department; and **Lt. Joseph Carrara**, Bourne Substance-Free Coalition and Deputy Chief of the Bourne Fire Department. A lively two hour question & answer session ensued with the panelists answering questions posed by the moderator (yours truly) and questions from the floor. The panelists also brought lots of informational handouts which you can find on the table in the Parish Hall. The panelists were terrific! They were knowledgeable and articulate and completely dedicated to meeting the addiction problem head-on.

I don’t know about the other people who attended this event, but I left knowing a whole lot more about opioid addiction and what can be done about it than I did before. We also left with a better idea of how this parish and its individual members can get involved in supporting the people on the “front lines”: the families, the doctors/nurses, police, and fire. Many thanks to Larry Higgins and Donna Beers for providing the leadership in putting this program together and for sharing their own deeply personal feelings. Thanks also to our Rector for her encouragement and guidance. **Deacon Bob**

VISIBLE VESTRY

Vestry had their monthly meeting on October 16, 2017.

1. Both our Open House on September 16 and our Rededication Service on September 29 were fabulous! To those who baked, helped set up, serve and clean up in the kitchen and those who did the actual planning for the activities, those who provided us with food, money and gift card donations and those who shared their stories of experiences and history with St. Peter's, so many of you made these celebrations a great success. Special thanks to Jackie Taylor for that beautiful sheet cake!!! Thank you also to our Music Department for the great music they provided.
2. The free will offering collected on September 29 was \$913.00 and will be donated to the Episcopal Relief and Development for hurricane relief efforts.
3. We will have our annual Holiday Fair on **November 4 from 9:00-3:00**. Any holiday or white elephant donations can be brought to the church before the cut-off date of October 30. Please leave them downstairs in the large meeting room cubicle, where the TV is located. Unpriced items should be put to the left side of the room. Items to the right have already been priced. No clothing please.

4. A sign-up sheet is posted in the Narthex for anyone that would like to help us to set up for the Fair. Set up will be on **Friday, November 3, starting at 10:00 a.m.** Also, if you can give any time on **Saturday, November 4 between 8:00 and 3:00** we would appreciate your help.
5. On October 14, the first of a two-part presentation regarding opioid addiction on Cape Cod was given and was well attended. The second session is being offered on October 21 from 10:00-12:30 and will include a panel of community professionals. Next steps for us: what can St. Peter's do to help with this crisis in our community? Thank you to the people who worked so hard in organizing these presentations: Donna Beers, Deacon Bob, Larry Higgins, and Rev. Sue.
6. Blessing of the Animals was a great success on its rescheduled date of October 15 after the rain on October 8. Buddy and Deacon Bob got to bless about 20 animals. The *Bourne Enterprise* was there to take photos and one appeared in the paper. Buddy must have sent out emails!!
7. On November 4, All Saints Sunday, there will be a total of 5 baptisms: One little saint at the 8:00 service and four at the 10:00 service!
8. Our Mattress making group has been busy every other Tuesday evening from 6:30 to 8:00 preparing materials and crocheting mattresses for the homeless. If you can crochet, they need you. Also, other volunteers are needed who can fold, cut, and tie bags together. Many hands make for light work!!!! See Charlotte Daigle if you have any further questions.
9. It's that time of the year again! A Nominating Committee has been appointed to come up with recommendations to fill open Vestry positions for 2018. There will be two 3-year terms, and one 2-year term to fill since Kathy Finnegan has had to resign her position due to health reasons.
10. The annual budget review will also begin in November. The Vestry asks for your prayers as we begin this difficult process of making your dollars work their magic for our ongoing expenses.
11. November 19 will be designated as Pledge Ingathering and Commitment Sunday. We ask all parishioners to pray about their pledges for 2018 and to think about what St. Peter's Church means to you in your life. Several of our parishioners will share with us why pledging to St. Peter's is important to them. They will be witnessing to us at the Sunday services on October 22 & 29 and November 12 & 29. Thank you to our Stewardship Team: Dianne Cartmill, Len Hathon and Steve Cloutman for all their hard work in preparing for our annual Stewardship Program.
12. On Sunday, November 19, from 2:00-4:00 we will have a craft and snack time with about 25 Amazing Grace children here at St. Peter's. Volunteers will be needed to assist with this outreach event. The children are all around 10-12 years old. There will be a sign-up sheet in the Narthex. If you have any further questions, please contact Margery Buckingham.
13. On November 4, Rev. Sue and Bruce Lederhouse, Ken Lihzis, and Merry Smythe will be attending the Diocesan Convention at our Cathedral in Boston.
14. The ladies turned out in large numbers for our Lindsey's Ladies Luncheon. We had an attendance of twenty-five women! It was a great time of laughs, good eats and good fellowship. Remember ladies, if

you couldn't attend this one, to try to make room on your schedule for the next one. This luncheon is open to all women, and your friends and relatives are also welcome to attend.

15. Remember to thank our jams and jelly ladies when you see them for all the hard work they have been doing in that very hot kitchen!!! They have been replenishing their supply to be sold at the November 4 Holiday Fair. If you haven't bought a Cat's Meow wooden replica of St. Peter's, they will also be available for sale at the Fair.

16. If anyone has any knitted or crocheted items they would like to donate to the Holiday Fair, please bring them to the meeting room at the church. We will have a separate table to display your handmade items.

17. The next Vestry meeting will be on Monday, November 20.
